write this opening to our 2020 newsletter less than 24 hours after the Prime Minister has declared that our country is now in "lockdown" due to the Coronavirus. It is somewhat surreal sitting at school with no Irvine Royal Academy pupils or staff and only a few children of critical Key Workers to support.

After reflecting on the past few days, I am more reassured than ever that the staff here really do go above and beyond to support young people. They have worked incredibly hard to prepare resource packs, upload materials on to Glow and in turn, set up



Google Classrooms to ensure high quality remote learning - this has been a huge learning curve for us all. As I write, staff are in regular contact with young people for a multiplicity of reasons but first and foremost, the key priority is to make sure that the health and wellbeing of our young people is prioritised. This is a time of real stress and the anxieties felt by our pupils cannot be minimised - we are here to help and have communicated our details on the various platforms available to us - we will continue to do so. We are still unclear about what is going to happen with the SQA in light of the exams being cancelled and we will communicate any information to you as and when we get it - I promise you that we will work hard to ensure that our pupils are in no way disadvantaged by this unprecedented situation.

Since the last newsletter was issued in December, the school has continued to go from strength to strength, Many of our young people make us proud on so many levels, whether that be through sporting success, musical achievements, Rotary events, Maths challenges or indeed just through the way in which the majority of them live and breathe our school values. Particular mention must go to our leavers and primarily our S6 leavers. I have had the pleasure of working closely with the Senior Pupil Leadership Team and I really cannot thank them enough. They have represented the school in a way that has brought me so much pride and without question, have played a significant part in making me feel part of the team here at Irvine Royal Academy – Jack, Amy, Emma and Payton – thank you from the bottom of my heart! Your support warmth, humour and sheer kindness will never, ever be forgotten.

We will now revert back to three DHTs and Mrs Clifford, who has been Acting DHT for the past two years, will continue to fill in for Mr Little until his return our thoughts are with Mr Little at this time. He is a highly valued member of the team at Irvine Royal and we all miss having him around.

Our Parent Council have continued to support the school in every which way possible and recently donated brand new school uniform for our pupils to access – they work tirelessly behind the scenes and deserve all the recognition they get – they go about their business with a positive attitude and I for one cannot thank

enough – we are very, very lucky to have such a dedicated bunch of parents continually working in partnership to make things better for our pupils.

Science Centre Trip



n Thursday the 20th of February S1 pupils visited Glasgow Science Centre to participate in a cyber security event. This allowed pupils to interact with professionals in the field of ethical hacking in order to learn more about the latest ways to stay safe online. This included learning about how long it would take for a supercomputer to hack their passwords and learning to crack codes using ethical hacking software. In addition to this, pupils were welcomed into the Science Centre's Planetarium. This spectacular state-of-the-art fulldome digital projection system encouraged pupils to be fascinated by space and increase their understanding of the universe. Finally, pupils were allowed to explore the science mall where they were able to interact with many of the fascinating displays and learn many of the real-world applications of science.

Medics Against Violence



fter Glasgow was recognised as the murder capital of Europe in 2008, the Scottish charity 'Medics Against Violence' was established and senior Modern Studies pupils at Irvine Royal Academy had the privilege to receive a presentation from three of their medical professionals.


During the presentation, each representative shared their own personal experiences of working with patients in Scotland who had fallen victim to extreme violence and the impact this has had on the lives of the victims, the attackers and the medical professionals who provided treatment. The presentation also included voices from various other people associated with violent crime, such as police officers and family members who have been affected. Students were also able to participate in a question and answering session with the medical professionals and delve further into their experiences of working on the front line. This experience overall was fascinating and strongly established the message that prevention is better than a cure!

Climate Ready Classrooms

eep Scotland Beautiful, a charity run by the Scottish government, visited Irvine Royal Academy to deliver the 'Climate Ready Classrooms' workshop to Miss McNeil and S3 Geography pupils. During the workshop, pupils got the opportunity to work directly with an environmental scientist who is working directly with the Scottish government to tackle climate change. Pupils learned the current imbalance between carbon sinks and carbon sources and the impact rising carbon emissions is subsequently having on our planet.

North Ayrshire Council recently announced a 'climate emergency', hence this workshop was a fantastic opportunity for our young people to engage in taking this initiative forward. Irvine Royal Academy are the first school in North Ayrshire to participate in the 'Climate Ready Classrooms' workshop and all pupils who were involved received Carbon Literacy accreditation for their efforts. All pupils have been encouraged to take their learning from this workshop forward and educate the wider school community on the reality of our current climate emergency.





Counter Terrorism Unit

enior Modern Studies and RMPS pupils were fortunate to receive a visit from an officer working for the Ayrshire Counter Terrorism Group—a specialised unit within Police Scotland. During the presentation, students learned about different terrorist organisations and how these groups are using propaganda to perform global radicalisation through social media. The officer also provided an insight the into de-escalation strategies that are being implemented both locally and globally to protect and safeguard our communities and their success rates.

Students were also made aware of the different levels of terrorism and the impact each attack can make, through the incorporation of recent examples of terrorism, such as the London and Manchester events. Later in the presentation, the officer opened the floor and allowed students to ask any questions they had, which created many opportunities for important conversations to be had. This presentation was an extremely valuable experience for our students and their learning!

ince August, S3 Spanish pupils have been enjoying regular blogs from our SCILT contact Alice in Honduras. She has been updating pupils with her progress and her experience during her gap year, which she is spending teaching English in a local school.

he UKMT Team Challenge is a series of UK-wide events composed of four rounds that make great use of problem-solving, team work and communication skills. For the first time, Irvine Royal Academy joined 23 other schools at Edinburgh University's informatics forum to compete for the chance to be one of the 90 schools to go through to the UK finals in London. However the Edinburgh event was one of 4 taking place in Scotland, meaning Irvine Royal was only one of around 100 schools taking part in the regional finals out of 339 secondary schools in Scotland.

Our amazing team of 4 was made up of Bayley Hanvey (S1), Chad Jenkins (S1), Hailey Allison (S2) and Sarah Jeffrey (S2); faced off against home competition first of all by being successful in the UKMT individual assessment, with 13 pupils going forward. However, it could have been 48 as that's how many pupils were interested in taking part! Despite not winning, our fantastic four upheld the school values throughout and we should all be very proud of them. The pupils had a great time during this trip and we can only reflect and look forward to next years competition. They very much worked well as a team from selection to the end—using up their lunchtimes to practice for the event! Please do wish them a well done if you see them!

\$1 Numeracy Group

he S1 numeracy life skills course has been developed and delivered by Mr Muirhead this term. Each week this group spend a double period in the Home Economics department where they work in pairs to bake. During this activity pupils learn about different units of measure and the practicalities of measuring ingredients. Then using division strategies they allocate cakes to pupils and staff in the group. Other activities include budgeting and working out profit margins.

In terms of life skills, pupils are shown how to operate an electrical oven, work out temperatures and timings and learn how to clean up after themselves. The main focus has been to build confidence in maths while interacting with others. This has been a great experience for all involved where adults have observed the improvement in pupil's confidence, specifically commenting on the number of positive relationships that are being formed in this group. Young people are clearly thriving in this environment, with one girl stating, "This group is the best part of my week".

The group also spend time in the classroom where they use different programs and strategies to consolidate the learning that takes place in the kitchen. We look forward to recommencing this group when we return!
